The season of 2022

Best forgotten is how many will describe it. Drought conditions and temperatures up to 22 degC in the lower river. However, there has been a very good influx of fish now the river is in spate so we hope for a bumper spawning season. And so why not volunteer for redd counting? – see below.

Don't forget to file your catch return - it is the measure that the EA use to gauge how the river is faring. So, not many days fished = not many fish caught = the EA thinks there are no fish in the river and further reduces the "probably at risk" category.




Video - to prove there are actually fish in the river though, including large sea-trout, click <u>here</u>

This incredible and inspiring drone video was taken by the EA in a balancing pipe in a weir in the main stem of the river. Proof that there are still fish entering our river with many bearing the scars of a hard and perilous journey. Let's hope they make it up to the spawning grounds.

The Strategic Exe Weirs project (SEW)

The Strategic Exe Weirs programme (SEW) has had a successful delivery season, with the first constructed fish passage improvements at Bridgetown Weir in 2022. We are moving



towards further 'construction ready' projects and making headway at the more challenging sites in Exeter.

Bridgetown Weir

A bespoke Larinier fish pass has been installed within the old fish pass channel. This will ensure that every salmon and trout that reaches Bridgetown Weir has the opportunity to continue upstream without delay.

The fish pass is accompanied by a new smolt chute and seasonal screening infrastructure. This will enable screens to be deployed for the smolt run and direct smolts back to the main river, removing delays and risk of damage.

The delivery was highly successful and an important step towards securing continued progress and external funding for further projects downriver.

Funding

The installation at Bridgetown cost in excess of £200,000. This phase was fully funded, without using RETA members' donations, with significant contributions from the EA, SWW and Exmoor National Park. This demonstrates the value of working in partnership with other key stakeholders. The commitment by RETA and the funds raised by donations from its members were instrumental in obtaining the funds from those third parties.

Members' donations are vital as they are used to fund Phil Turnbull's role and to finance the planning stage for each barrier before construction which is very difficult to fund externally.

The SEW project is gathering momentum and we need to continue to show RETA's commitment. So thank you to all those who have donated and to all members, please donate to the SEW project to enable us to build on this initial success.

Round-up of just some of the other on-going RETA projects

Geographic Information System (GIS)

We are organising a huge amount of historic data into a GIS database and this will enable us to map trends and detail with illustrative graphics and far greater efficiency than ever before

The GIS data should be fully up to date by Spring 2023 and some select example maps will be available then. Following this there will be created the ArcGIS Online map for open access and querying by RETA.

Gravel Cleaning

A programme of gravel cleaning in the River Exe catchment has been completed with funding from RETA with the use of a local contractor Tom Stephens. This is the first year a contractor has been commissioned for this work.

Six sites were specifically cleaned for students from the University of Plymouth who are looking at the immediate impact of gravel cleaning (e.g. change in sediment profile and impact on invertebrates). The results will help indicate gravel cleaning efficacy and where the technique may best be employed.

Junior Tuition



Another brilliant day out for the young from 8yo -16yo was organised by Fred Leach as an introduction to the gentle art of fly-fishing. Held at Exe Valley fly fishing in September the day was a great success. All participants under 16 automatically qualified for **FREE membership** of RETA and Dulverton Anglers Association (DAA) for one year.

AGM


The annual AGM is to be held at the Hartnoll Hotel, Bolham at 6.30pm (doors open at 6pm) on Friday 10th March 2023.
